Contest Rules

Deadline: March 15th, 2021

Eligibility: Participants must be 14 to 17 years of age inclusively and members of one of the eleven Indigenous nations recognized in Québec.

Length and genre: Submissions must be written in the form of a folktale or legend—traditional stories, personal adaptations of existing tales, or entirely original works are eligible. The jury will remain flexible and open as to what constitutes folktales and legends.

Maximum length is 1500 words (there is no minimum). Texts may be written in English, French or an Indigenous language.

Limit of one submission per person.
